r. Koinange Wahome was sworn into office as the county secretary after a competitive recruitment process, vetting by the county assembly and eventual appointment by the Governor. The county secretary is the head of the county public service (Article 235 of the Kenyan Constitution). He is responsible for arranging the business and keeping the minutes, of the county executive committee subject to the directions of the executive committee.

The county secretary also conveys the decisions of the county executive committee to the appropriate persons or authorities. Lastly, the county secretary may perform any other functions as directed by the county executive committee. The County Public Service Board may delegate, in writing, any of its functions to the county secretary.

In his inaugural speech the County Secretary expressed his gratitude to the governor for trusting him with this office and promised to revitalize public service in Laikipia ensuring that the governor's commitment to serve all without favoritism is cascaded down in the whole public service.

Road to Actualizing the Warehouse Receipt System in Laikipia

ccording to Laikipia County Statistical Abstract, 2021, agriculture is a source of livelihoods to 158,361 individuals in Laikipia County from 90,729 farming households across the county.

Laikipia West accounts for the largest share in that tabulation.

Maize production is a key enterprise in Laikipia West. The county's average maize production is 133,834 MT, 65 percent of this coming from Laikipia West (Laikipia county statistical abstract, 2021).

This has necessitated the County Government to adopt and implement Warehouse Receipting System model, a model whose objective is to stream-line the grain trade in the county.

In line with the Governor's manifesto, the County Department of Agriculture has made tremendous efforts to operationalize Warehouse receipt system in Laikipia. This is a business model that would reduce post-harvest losses, enhance access to market and finance. The target clients in Laikipia are the grain producers.

In partnership with Agricultural Sector Development Programme (ASDSP II) and EU-IDEAS Project, the department has intensively capacity built the targeted major users namely; Ngarua Cereals Cooperative Society, Msinduka Cooperative Society and Sipili Cereals and Marketing Cooperative Society, and depositors on warehouse receipt system principles.

The Agricultural officers have also regularly been

training farmers from planting to production to ensure that farmers reduce the post-harvest losses.

Eastern Africa Grain Council (EAGC) and Warehouse receipt System Council (WRSC) have been pertinent service providers in operationalizing WRS in Laikipia.

In the most recent activity, the Department of Agriculture in collaboration with Warehouse Receipt System Council carried out sensitization among the warehouse operators and depositors in Kinamba, Mutanga and Sipili Warehouses on WRS.



WRS Council also carried out a warehouse inspection for the three facilities in readiness for certification. The team will give a report on the findings and recommendations of the inspection carried out on them.

The farmers in Laikipia West have showed their appreciation for the tremendous efforts made by the County Government of Laikipia led by H.E Governor Joshua Irungu EGH in ensuring that the Living standards of farmers is improved.

Health

he government has sought to Restore Health Services, Improve Health Infrastructure; in partnership with the National Government to achieve 100% Universal Health Coverage (UHC).

- Reinstated 33 doctors who have already reported to their respective work stations to the reprieve of the people. This has enhanced quality of service delivery and has gone a long way in improving confidence and morale of the health workers.
- Hired more specialized health workers, a boost towards full functionality of the health services across the county.
- Nanyuki Teaching and Referral Hospital has hired an Oncologist (cancer care specialist) as well as an orthopedic surgeon and a Physician for the Nyahururu County and Referral Hospital.
- In the last three months, there has been a constant supply of essential drugs to the tune of Ksh55.5million

- to all the health facilities. This has lessened the staff demotivation associated with the provision of poor health care.
- Development and review of the Community Health Service Bill is complete. The bill is meant to entrench and mainstream all issues dealing with community health workers thus a milestone for primary healthcare in the county.
- Engagements for the commencement of the KMTC Nanyuki Campus are complete and the first intake is expected in September 2023 if not earlier.
- Other activities include; an increase of Renal Dialysis Machines by five at the Nayuki Teaching and Referral Hospital, construction and equipping of the Rabal dispensary in Sossian Ward and the completetion of the procurement process for CT scans at the Nanyuki and Nyahururu hospitals

Public Administration

nitiated the termination of the fund draining leasing programme. So far, it has been able to return the vehicles on lease to their respective owners, (Toyota Kenya) but remaining with four Simba Colt Lorries which are operational awaiting decision by the county executive.

Agriculture

- upplied food relief worth Ksh 100 million to schools and communities in the drought affected areas in conjunction with the national government. This has ensured no loss of life and no child drops school from lack of food.
- Excavated and desilted four dams in Umande, Marmanet, Rumuruti and Ol- Moran wards. In these areas, 40 farmers have been trained on the management of water resources. Horticultural activities around the dams are on a sharp rise.
- Enhanced animal production, livestock marketing and value.
- A total of 140 farm demonstrations in various livestock productions have been carried out across the 15 wards.
- Embraced apiculture and has conducted trainings and demonstrations in modern and efficient bee-keeping technologies. This has brought fourth an increase in honey production and subsequent extra income to our farmers.

Education and Social Development

- uccessfully enrolled 648 new trainees in ten Vocational Training Centers (VTCs), which had challenges in enrollment occasioned by effects of the Covid 19 pandemic. The revenue generated in these institutions increased to over Ksh 30million and it is expected to rise in subsequent years.
- Put 564 teachers under the scheme of service for ECDE.
- The Ward Bursary committees are now in place, an assurance that the Ksh. 50 million bursary kitty will have been disbursed by the time schools open in January 2023.

Governance

he process of elevating Nanyuki and Nyahururu to Municipality Status has been initiated through the office of the County Executive Committee Member. It is expected to be completed within the 3rd quarter of the fiscal year.

Trade

- perationalized the County Enterprise Revolving Fund. This will enable the people to access affordable start-up and working capital for businesses that are excluded from formal financial systems because of high cost of credit and strict credit requirements.
- Renewed the MoU with the Stanbic Foundation, an organization that is committed to build capacity and support the informal traders in the county.
- So far, 300 traders have benefited from the fund to a tune of 5 million

Infrastructure

hrough the Digital Land Governance Programme funded by EU through FAO, the department has submitted a work plan of various land related activities to be actualized through this programme. The activities include; finalization of the County Spatial Plan, preparation of plans for 12 urban centres across the county, planning and

surveying of informal settlements and market centres for tenure security. There has been countywide streetlights audit and inspection as well as repairing and maintenance of streetlight and floodlights.

Other activities have been inspection, repair and maintenance of electrical installations at county facilities.

Security

nsured that more than 100km of security roads in the areas affected by insecurity have been opened up, graded and murramed. This has ensured frequent patrols by the security forces thus a boost to the security.

Acquired land for the construction of extra police patrol bases especially on the notorious escape routes by cattle rustlers from the neighboring counties.

NCRH Efforts in Diabetes Control

It is worth noting that NHIF covers consultation, lab tests, treatment, imaging and medication to the DOPC patients.



Diabetes refers to a group of disease in which a person has high blood sugar this condition affects how your body turns food into energy. It occurs when the pancreas fails to produce enough insulins or when the body cannot effectively use the insulin it produces.

he Diabetes Outpatient Clinic (DOPC) at Nyahururu County Referral Hospital specializes in the management and prevention of diabetes and hypertension diseases.

The clinic is a one stop clinic where registration and payments are conducted in the same vicinity. This helps in reducing movements. The clinics run Monday to Friday with an estimate of 40 patients every day.

Regular checkups include continuous glucose monitoring and tests, hypertension screening, nutrition and wellness reviews. Patients are educated on how to check their diet and weight.

Another programme offered at the

point is Control Diabetes in Children, DIC, which supports children and teenagers suffering from diabetes. Insulin is provided and also some tests concerning diabetes are catered for by the programme. Enrollment is free to those between 0-21 years of age.

It is worth noting that NHIF covers consultation, lab tests, treatment, imaging and medication to the DOPC patients.

NRCH has always been consistent with its efforts in disease control interventions. A good example is its medical staff, Renal nurse Mary Jebet Satony together with other nurses joining the world to mark Diabetes awareness Month by conducting di-

abetes and hypertension screening in Nyahururu market.

The exercise benefited 123 patients where thirty eight patients who were diagnosed with hypertension and high blood sugar levels were advised to seek medical attention with immediate effect.

"The risk of progression from pre-diabetes to type 2 diabetes is quite high, especially if left untreated. When detected early, the patient may not only delay but even prevent progression to diabetes. Disease prevention is significantly less expensive than the treatment of hyperglycemia and diabetic complications". Says Jebet.

3rd Multi-agency meeting on Land, **Environment and Infrastructure**

The meeting's motto was, "if we do not take a deliberate effort to correct the issues surrounding the Land, infrastructure, environment and natural resources sectors 'today' the future will remain uncertain and the damage will over time become irreversible."

he County Government of Laikipia had its third multi-agency consultative meeting on December 1, 2022. Various stakeholders converged at the meeting to discuss crucial issues involving land, infrastructure, the environment, and natural resources.

Throughout the day, range of topics were discussed including: reducing and expediting land-related cases; the planning process, which includes spatial plans, urban plans, area plans, and map digitization; the severity of violations on existing plans; and the social, economic, and environmental effects of encroachments by Laikipia residents.

Additionally, the meeting also sought to explain the legal requirements that govern land use and classification. A recommendation was made that there should be proper documentation of public land through planning, surveying, and titling; registration of all surrendered land and outdated land.

The multi-agency meeting served as the kickoff for the reenergized effort to find a long-term solution regarding land concerns in the county. Particularly difficult topics including illegitimate property titles, misuse of allotment letters, and the reclamation of public land that has fallen under private hands were addressed.

The team, drawn from various county and national departments, sought to find common ground through proper coordination and to solve encroachment cases and land grabbing through a streamlined framework that will ensure due processes in land transactions are followed.

Going forward, the team agreed that individual parties will play their respective roles and adhere to legal requirements in building approval, title deed issuance, and road and railway path demarcation.



You are very young in such senior position, such is some of our managers at County Government.

I always say, grow yourself to be admired and be role model: 1 Timothy 4:12

"Let no one despise you for your youth, but set the believers an example in speech, in conduct, in love, in faith, in purity."

Remember this, youthfulness is not a weakness: Jeremiah 1:6:7

"O Sovereign Lord," I said, "I can't speak for you! I'm too young!" The Lord replied, "Don't say, 'I'm too young,' for you must go wherever I send you and say whatever I tell you!"

What does the bible say about financial prudency Bishop?

"If it is encouraging, let him encourage; if it is contributing to the needs of others, let him give generously; if it is leadership, let him govern diligently; if it is showing mercy, let him do it cheerfully."

Role models: 1 Peter 5:2-3

"Shepherd the flock of God that is among you, exercising oversight, not under compulsion, but willingly, as God would have you; not for shameful gain, but eagerly; not domineering over those in your charge, but being examples to the flock."

As you finish, what would be your personal advice to Governor, his deputy, and the new senior managers?
