Executive Summary

This Public Participation Report documents the consultative process undertaken in January and February 2026 to inform the CFSP and DMSP 2026/2027. These are key policy documents that outline the county's fiscal priorities, guides resource allocation, sets the framework for budget preparation and guide on how the County may acquire and manage debt.

The report begins by situating public participation within the legal framework established by the Constitution of Kenya, the Public Finance Management Act, the County Governments Act, and the Access to Information Act. These laws collectively mandate citizen involvement in fiscal planning, transparency in resource allocation and accountability in governance.

The purpose of the report is to provide a structured record of the forums held and capture stakeholder comments and proposals. The objectives include documenting the consultative process, ensuring inclusivity and reinforcing transparency in fiscal decision-making.

The County Treasury organized three types of engagements:

- A meeting with Civil Society Organizations on **30th January 2026**.
- Five open public forums across sub-counties on **10th February 2026**.
- An online forum on **11th February 2026**.

These engagements were designed to capture diverse perspectives, ranging from governance and transparency to health, education, infrastructure, climate change and social protection. The forums also emphasized gender inclusivity.

This report captures stakeholder inputs where the aggregated proposals are mapped against sectoral priorities, with clear indications of how citizen voices have shaped fiscal decisions.

In conclusion, this report demonstrates the county's commitment to participatory governance. By embedding public participation into fiscal planning, the County Government strengthens the social contract with its citizens and lays the foundation for sustainable, inclusive development.

CHAPTER ONE

INTRODUCTION AND LEGAL FRAMEWORK

1.1 Introduction

Public participation is a cornerstone of democratic governance and a constitutional imperative in Kenya. It ensures that citizens are not passive recipients of government decisions but active contributors to policy formulation, planning and fiscal management. In preparing the County Fiscal Strategy Paper and Debt Management Strategy Paper 2026/2027, the County Government of Laikipia has embraced this principle by organizing consultative, open and digital forums.

This chapter outlines the legal framework that mandates and guides public participation in the preparation of the CFSP and DMSP, as well as other relevant regulations and policies that shape the process.

1.2 Constitutional Provisions

The Constitution of Kenya, 2010 provides the overarching framework for public participation:

- **Article 10(2)(a):** Declares “participation of the people” as one of the national values and principles of governance. This provision obligates all state organs and public officers to involve citizens in decision-making processes.
- **Article 201(a):** Establishes principles of public finance, stating that “there shall be openness and accountability, including public participation in financial matters.” This ensures that fiscal decisions are transparent and subject to citizen input.
- **Article 232(1)(d):** Lists “involvement of the people in the process of policy making” as a key value of public service. This provision reinforces the need for participatory governance across all levels of government.

1.3 Public Finance Management Act, 2012

The Public Finance Management Act (PFMA), 2012 operationalizes constitutional principles in the realm of fiscal management.

- **Section 117(5):** Requires the County Treasury to seek views of the public before finalizing the CFSP. This provision makes public participation a mandatory step in the CFSP preparation process.
- **Section 123(4):** Similarly obligates the County Treasury to publish and publicize the County Debt Management Strategy Paper (DMSP) within seven days of submission to the Assembly.
- **Section 125(2):** States that the county budget process shall include public participation. This ensures that citizen input is not limited to the CFSP but extends to the entire budget cycle.

1.4 County Governments Act, 2012

The County Governments Act, 2012 further elaborates on the principles and mechanisms of citizen participation.

- **Section 87:** Outlines the principles of citizen participation, including timely access to information, inclusivity, respect for diversity and promotion of equity.
- **Section 115:** Mandates public participation in county planning processes, stating that “public participation in the county planning processes shall be mandatory.”
- **Section 91:** Provides for the establishment of modalities and platforms for citizen participation, such as town hall meetings, budget preparation forums and information communication technology platforms.

1.5 Access to Information Act, 2016

This Act complements the above provisions by guaranteeing citizens the right to information.

- **Section 4(1):** States that “every citizen has the right of access to information held by the State.”
- **Section 5:** Obligates public entities to proactively disclose information, including policies, budgets, and plans.

1.6 Other Relevant Regulations and Policies

In addition to the Constitution and Acts of Parliament, several regulations and policies guide public participation in fiscal matters:

- **Public Finance Management (County Governments) Regulations, 2015:** Provide detailed procedures for county budget processes, including requirements for public participation at various stages.
- **National Policy on Public Participation (Draft, 2018):** Although not yet enacted into law, this policy provides guidance on best practices for citizen engagement, emphasizing inclusivity, transparency and accountability.
- **County Public Participation Guidelines (issued by the Ministry of Devolution and Planning):** Offer practical tools for counties to design and implement participatory processes, including templates for notices, forums and reporting.
- **Standing Orders of the County Assembly:** Require that budget documents, including the CFSP, be subjected to public input before adoption.

The legal framework for public participation in the CFSP is robust, encompassing constitutional provisions, statutory requirements, regulations and policy guidelines. Together, these instruments ensure that fiscal planning is transparent, inclusive and accountable. By adhering to this framework, the County Government of Laikipia not only fulfils its legal obligations but also strengthens the social contract with its citizens.

CHAPTER TWO

PURPOSE AND OBJECTIVES OF THE PUBLIC PARTICIPATION REPORT

2.1 Introduction

This chapter outlines the purpose and objectives of the Public Participation Report on the CFSP and DMSP for the fiscal year 2026/2027.

2.2 Purpose of the Public Participation Report

This Public Participation Report serves several critical purposes:

1. **Compliance with Legal Requirements**

Demonstrates adherence to constitutional provisions on openness and accountability in public finance. It also provides evidence that the county has fulfilled its statutory duty under Section 115 of the County Governments Act, 2012.

2. **Transparency and Accountability**

Ensures that fiscal and debt management decisions are made openly, with citizens informed of borrowing plans, expenditure priorities, and revenue strategies. It Provides a record of citizen contributions, showing how public views influenced the CFSP and DMSP.

3. **Documentation of the Participation Process**

Records the methods used (public forums, stakeholder workshops, online submissions, written memoranda). It Captures the breadth of participation, including geographic coverage and representation of different social groups.

4. **Feedback Mechanism**

Serves as a channel through which citizens can see how their input was considered and Strengthens trust between county leadership and residents by showing responsiveness to public concerns.

2.3 Objectives of the Public Participation Report

The main objectives of preparing and publishing the Public Participation Report on the CFSP and DMSP 2026/2027 include:

1. **Promote Inclusive Governance**

Ensure that all segments of society i.e youth, women, persons with disabilities, business community, and marginalized groups are involved in fiscal and debt management decisions.

2. **Enhance Fiscal Responsibility**

Provide citizens with an opportunity to scrutinize proposed revenue measures, expenditure priorities and borrowing plans.

3. **Strengthen Policy Legitimacy**

Build consensus around county fiscal and debt strategies by incorporating citizen perspectives.

4. **Improve Decision-Making Quality**

Harness local knowledge and community insights to refine fiscal priorities and debt management strategies.

5. **Institutionalize Accountability**

Provide a formal record that can be audited and reviewed by oversight bodies such as the county Assembly and the Office of the Auditor-General.

2.4 Linkage to CFSP and DMSP

The Public Participation Report is directly linked to the CFSP and DMSP in the following ways:
County Fiscal Strategy Paper (CFSP): Public input shapes revenue projections, expenditure priorities and deficit financing strategies.

Debt Management Strategy Paper (DMSP): Citizen views inform borrowing objectives, debt sustainability measures, and risk management strategies.

Budget Preparation: Once adopted, the CFSP and DMSP guide the annual budget estimates. The Public Participation Report ensures that these guiding documents reflect citizen priorities.

2.5 Conclusion

The Public Participation Report on the CFSP and DMSP 2026/2027 is more than a compliance document. It is a cornerstone of participatory governance. Its purpose is to demonstrate transparency, accountability and inclusivity, while its objectives are to enhance fiscal responsibility, strengthen legitimacy and institutionalize accountability.

By preparing and publishing this report, the county government affirms its commitment to the constitutional principles of openness and citizen involvement in public finance. Ultimately, the report ensures that fiscal and debt management strategies are not only technically sound but also socially legitimate and publicly owned.

Beyond its immediate objectives, the report has broader significance for governance and development. It strengthens the social contract between government and citizens by embedding participation into fiscal planning. It enhances the legitimacy of the CFSP and DMSP by showing that it is not a top-down document but a co-created strategy. It also provides a learning tool for future participatory processes, highlighting best practices and areas for improvement.

In this way, the report contributes to the realization of constitutional values, statutory obligations, and policy goals. It ensures that fiscal planning is not only technically sound but also socially responsive, equitable and inclusive.

CHAPTER THREE

PUBLIC ENGAGEMENTS AND STAKEHOLDER INPUT

3.1 Introduction

The County Treasury organized a series of forums to ensure broad-based participation. On 30th January 2026, Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) were engaged in a dedicated meeting to provide insights on governance, transparency and accountability. On 10th February 2026, five open public forums were held across the county, bringing together community members, business groups, youth, women and persons with disabilities. Finally, on 11th February 2026, an online forum was conducted to enable residents to participate through digital platforms.

Each forum was designed to encourage dialogue, gather proposals and ensure inclusivity. Notices were issued through one newspaper of national circulation, radio station, churches, social media platforms and community notice boards to ensure maximum awareness. Venues selected were accessible.

The diversity of participants ensured that the CFSP reflects the needs of different groups within the county. The forums also provided an opportunity for county officials to explain fiscal processes, thereby enhancing transparency and accountability.

3.1.1 Civil Society Organizations (CSO) Meeting

The first engagement on 30th January 2026 was a dedicated meeting with Civil Society Organizations (CSOs). These groups play a critical role in advocating for transparency, accountability, and social justice. The meeting was convened with invitations sent to registered CSOs through official correspondence.

The session was structured to allow CSOs to present position papers and thematic briefs. Discussions were expected to focus on governance reforms, equitable resource allocation, and mechanisms for monitoring fiscal implementation. The County Treasury provided technical presentations on the CFSP process, after which CSOs offered feedback and recommendations. This engagement was particularly important because CSOs often act as intermediaries between government and citizens, amplifying community concerns.

- Provide targeted economic empowerment grants for women, youth and PWDs.

3.4 Outreach and Mobilization

To ensure broad participation, the County Government employed multiple outreach strategies. Announcements were made through local radio stations, community notice boards and social media platforms. Religious institutions and schools were also engaged to spread information.

Inclusivity is not only about diverse thematic inputs but also about ensuring balanced representation across genders. The County Treasury encourages participation by men, women, youth and PWD's. This was evident during the forums which recorded attendance of a total 519 participants; 263 males, 256 females of which 157 were youth and 15 PWDs.

CSO Meeting: Male and female participants were represented in nearly equal numbers, with CSOs ensuring that women's voices were amplified in discussions on governance and accountability.

Open Forums: Women's participation was strong, while youth representation was also significant, reflecting the county's demographic profile.

Online Forum: Digital platforms attracted a diverse mix of participants, including and young people.

By documenting gender participation, this report underscores the county's commitment to inclusivity. It also provides a basis for analyzing how different groups engage with fiscal processes, thereby informing strategies for future participation.

3.6 Integration into the CFSP

The stakeholder inputs, have been reviewed and integrated into the CFSP and DMSP. Each proposal has been mapped against sectoral priorities, with clear indications of how citizen voices have shaped fiscal decisions. Gender perspectives have been mainstreamed across all sectors, ensuring that the CFSP is not only technically sound but also socially responsive.

CHAPTER FOUR

SUMMARY AND CONCLUSION

The County Government of Laikipia undertook a comprehensive public participation process to obtain views from residents and key stakeholders during the preparation of the County Fiscal Strategy Paper (CFSP) 2026/2027 and the Debt Management Strategy Paper (DMSP) 2026/2027. The process was conducted in accordance with the Constitution of Kenya, 2010, the Public Finance Management Act, 2012 and other applicable legal and policy frameworks that emphasize citizen participation, transparency and accountability in public finance management. The exercise was coordinated by the County Treasury through the Budget Team, with the objective of ensuring that county fiscal priorities, budget ceilings and debt management strategies are responsive to public needs while aligning with development priorities.

The public participation exercise sought to inform residents and stakeholders on the county's fiscal outlook, expenditure priorities and debt position, while collecting views and proposals on sector priorities, resource allocation and service delivery. It also aimed at obtaining feedback on the county's borrowing framework and debt sustainability measures at the same time strengthening transparency, accountability and public ownership of fiscal and debt management decisions.

To ensure inclusivity and broad-based engagement, the County Treasury adopted a mixed-method approach utilizing both physical and virtual platforms. The process comprised of an online public participation meeting, open public fora and a stakeholder engagement forum. These platforms enabled participation by members of the public, civil society organizations, the private sector, faith-based institutions, professionals and other key interest groups. Participants were taken through the content of the CFSP and DMSP, including the county's macro-fiscal framework, revenue projections, expenditure priorities, debt portfolio and proposed debt management strategies.

The public participation forums were widely publicized to ensure adequate awareness and meaningful participation. Notices were disseminated through newspaper advertisements, radio announcements, SMS alerts and public notices circulated through churches and other community institutions. This multi-channel communication strategy ensured that information reached diverse population groups across the county, including vulnerable and hard-to-reach communities.

Several key issues emerged from the public participation process. Participants emphasized the need to prioritize funding for essential services and high-impact development projects, particularly in health, water, agriculture, education and infrastructure. There were strong calls for improved efficiency, transparency and accountability in the use of public resources, as well as prudent borrowing practices to safeguard the county's fiscal sustainability.

All views and submissions received during the public participation process were documented and reviewed by the County Treasury through the Budget Team. Relevant proposals were incorporated into the final CFSP and DMSP 2026/2027, while other submissions were noted for consideration during the annual budget process and future planning cycles.

In conclusion, the public participation process for the CFSP and DMSP 2026/2027 was inclusive, participatory and transparent. The process enriched the quality of fiscal and debt policy formulation and reaffirmed the County Government's commitment to participatory governance, prudent financial management, and sustainable development.




